

**Motion regarding Teaching Loads – Faculty
As amended on April 19, 2012**

Motion

The faculty senate recommends that a survey be distributed to full time T&R faculty examining the issues related to regular teaching loads, overloads and compensation policies for overloads in their department. This survey will be administered electronically, with faculty being contacted through email.

Rationale

The RAC has been tasked with examining the issue of compensation for course overloads. One manner of addressing this issue is to request information from full time faculty members. The survey questions will address experiences full time faculty members have had with course overloads and compensation for course overloads. The questions to be administered follow.

Faculty survey on teaching overloads

For this survey, we define a course overload as an additional section beyond that which is "expected" or "anticipated" in your program, considering adjustments for research or administrative release AND an enrollment overload as an increase in a class enrollment above the traditional enrollment cap for a course you were scheduled to teach. A teaching overload could be either a course overload or an enrollment overload. While answering the questions, please include only those activities that involve students taking courses for academic credit.
